

About The Curriculum

The Douglass curriculum is designed to ensure that you leave Rutgers with a robust resume full of the academic, professional, and co-curricular experiences that will make you a competitive candidate in the job market, graduate school application process, or any other endeavor you choose to pursue.

To complete the curriculum, you will follow a roadmap of programming. At each stop along the way, **you will pick** an opportunity that fits your aspirations while aiming to satisfy three of four requirement buckets.

Take Knowledge & Power (Required)

Complete Your Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Requirement (Required)

Knowledge and Power Issues in Women's Leadership

Calling all future leaders! This required course at Douglass introduces you to foundational concepts in understanding the status of women, literature, and leadership. Participate in critical conversations, chart out an academic plan, and learn to write and present academic research. Discuss systems of power, prepare for the diverse global workforce, and connect to Douglass programs and resources.



How do I start?

Students enroll in Knowledge and Power during registration. To register for your classes, log on to <u>webreg.rutgers.edu</u>. The course number for Knowledge and Power is 01:988:130. It is worth 3 credits and satisfies the following Rutgers general education requirements: *Diversities and Social Inequalities (CCD), Our Common Future (CCO)*.

I'm not a first-year. When do I take K & P?

Good question! Douglass includes many transfer students, nontraditional students, and students who joined Douglass later in their undergraduate careers. Knowledge and Power is still for you! The College recommends you enroll in Knowledge and Power your first semester as a Douglass student—whenever that may be. However, you are permitted to enroll in Knowledge and Power in any semester up to your final undergraduate semester at Rutgers. If you need help deciding when to enroll in Knowledge and Power, please reach out to your staff mentor.


DegreeNavigator

DegreeNavigator is the Rutgers University online tool that tracks your progress through all courses at Rutgers. Your Douglass curriculum is also included on DegreeNavigator. DegreeNavigator will be updated in the Spring semester of each year to reflect your progress through the Douglass curriculum.

How does my progress get recorded in DegreeNavigator? Douglass tracks your progress in DegreeNavigator in one of three ways:

- 1. You've satisfied the requirement with a course or program listed in DegreeNavigator. This is recorded and there is nothing further you must do.
- 2. You've satisfied the requirement with a Douglass opportunity **not** listed in DegreeNavigator. Since this is a Douglass offering, the Douglass staff will have a record of your participation and record it automatically when they annually update DegreeNavigator (updated once per year). There is nothing further you must do.
- 3. You've satisfied the requirement with an opportunity **not** listed in DegreeNavigator and **not** offered by Douglass. The Douglass staff will **not** automatically have a record of your participation. To have your participation reviewed and recorded in DegreeNavigator, please fill out the form **here.**

Frequently Asked Questions

What are the components of the curriculum?

There are 3 requirements: R1 is taking the Knowledge & Power course, R2 is engaging in DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion), R3 is engaging in career or research development.

Does anything count towards the requirements besides what's listed here? Yes!

Douglass is open to counting experiences from around the community towards your requirements. If you think you've completed an experience that should count, please submit it **here!** If your participation in the program is appropriate and approved, your DegreeNavigagor will be updated at the end of the spring semester. If it is not approved, a staff mentor will reach out to you. For questions, please reach out to leslie.danehy@rutgers.edu.

If I don't take a class listed on DegreeNavigator under one of the requirements, can I still fulfill the requirement? Yes. Students must complete a course listed in DegreeNavigator, a program listed above, or 2 hours of programming in each category per years they are enrolled in Douglass. For instance, a student who enrolls in Douglass as a first year will complete 8 hours of programming in each category over the course of their undergraduate career. A student who transfers in as a Junior will only complete four hours of programming in each category over the course of their time at Rutgers. Hours do **NOT** have to be dispersed equally over your years.

Does the Douglass curriculum affect my Rutgers school or graduation requirements? No, you may graduate without completing the Douglass Curriculum requirements. If you do complete the Douglass Curriculum Requirements you will receive the Douglass Certificate.

If I am graduating in 2023 or 2024, do I need to complete the Douglass requirements? No, but it is highly recommended to complete the Knowledge and Power course.

My DegreeNavigator is not correct. What can I do?

DegreeNavigator is updated once per year. If you completed a program in fall, it might not show up in DegreeNavigator until the spring. If you still have questions, please reach out to your staff mentor.

I am a transfer student. Do I still need to complete the Douglass Curriculum? Yes, there are many Douglass opportunities to join. You can also participate in multiple programs during one semester.
